# 2024-2025 Brighton Middle School Band Handbook

## **PARENT-SPECIFIC INFORMATION:**

#### **BAND FEES:**

Annual band fees are a necessary part of our band program's success and thus are **mandatory**. This year's band fee is **\$60** for Brighton Middle School band students. The fee covers the expense of your child's band t-shirt (will be distributed in the Spring), method book (if applicable), wind breakers (8th grade), classroom supplies, purchase/maintenance of school owned instruments, copyright fees, organization fees, printer ink/paper, music expense, and many other expenses throughout the year.

Please make checks payable to the Brighton Band Boosters.

Fee waiver does not cover the band fee. Band fees need to be paid by **September 16th**. If there is a problem paying the band fee on time, please email Mr. Kelly at <a href="mailto:akelly@tipton-county.com">akelly@tipton-county.com</a>.

#### **BAND BOOSTERS:**

The Brighton Band Booster program is the heart of our organization. The Brighton High School Band Boosters and the Brighton Middle School Band Boosters are the same, joint organization; if you are on Facebook, please look up the Brighton Band Boosters page. These parents work very hard to make sure we have the needed materials whether it's instruments, uniforms, music, repairs, or support. The boosters make so much happen for this band program. We will provide more information on meeting times at a later date.

#### **FUNDRAISING:**

The band program is funded by the booster program. Fundraising is necessary within most school programs and, aside from band fees, covers 100% of our operation costs. We do not receive money from the school board. This money goes to maintaining and replacing school instruments, subsidizing field trips, office supplies, sheet music, bringing in extra staff, purchasing items for the overall need of the band program, etc.

#### **CHAPERONES:**

If you are interested in being a chaperone for the Brighton Band, you must first complete a background check through the Tipton County Board of Education. Mr. Kelly will post opportunities for chaperones when any time the band performs or travels as a large group (parades, recruiting events, etc). We will also need chaperones when hosting events such as our spring dance fundraiser. Please check the Middle School band page and Remind for information.

#### LATE-START STUDENTS / 7TH AND 8TH GRADE BEGINNING BAND STUDENTS

Every year, there are students that ask if they can join band, and the answer in most cases is YES! Because of the progressive nature of band, however, students that join band after 6th grade are usually behind in terms of experience and ability for the first few weeks/months. In an effort to help bridge the experience gap, all students that join band after their 6th grade year are required to attend Mr. Kelly's after school tutoring, where they will work with either a high school student in a leadership position (also known as section leaders) or a Brighton Band staff member (Mr. Kelly, Mr. Mayo, etc). Each student will be assessed weekly to check progress, and may eventually become proficient enough to forgo the tutoring sessions. These after school tutoring sessions, in combination with the daily band period, will integrate students into the band while giving them the extra help that they need.

#### PRACTICING AT HOME:

Students will quickly learn that the middle school bands' motto is "Go Practice!" Students should take their personal instruments home every day. School owned instruments may be taken home with Mr. Kelly's approval. Playing an instrument is a physical activity, requiring time and repetition to develop proper muscles and coordination. Practicing on just weekends is virtually useless as proven through various studies. Despite busy schedules, students need to put in some time on their instrument every day. We recommend to students to practice at least 15 minutes a day when they star and to practice 30 minutes a day by the spring semester of their 6th grade year. If time is used wisely, a lot can be accomplished in a short time period. Private lessons are not required in the Brighton Bands, but they are recommended. If you are interested in finding a private lesson instructor, feel free to contact me.

## **PRIVATE LESSONS** —Not required but strongly encouraged —

Private lessons are paid instructional time for students with a private teacher. It is the fastest way for a student to attain individual improvement. In private lessons, students focus on fundamentals, skill development, etudes, and other musical elements. While we strive to provide students with the best education possible, it is impossible to provide each individual with hours of individual feedback and instruction. Students who take private lessons then to develop a command of the instrument, have increased enjoyment of playing, increase their chance of making All-West, and have higher potential for scholarships to college. While lessons are not required, they are strongly encouraged. Private lessons ordinarily range anywhere from \$40-60 an hour but can be more expensive depending on the individual's credentials. Cheaper options may be available through studying under a successful high school or college student. The school, staff, and band program are in no way shape or form associated with private lesson instruction and assumes no liability of any kind from lessons or profit from lessons. If you are interested in finding an instructor, please contact Mr. Kelly.

#### **PERFORMANCES:**

One of the greatest experiences in band is getting to perform. Here at Brighton, we have several opportunities to perform, and it is important to know which concerts we will be involved in. Each performing group has a different set of performances throughout the year. **Please check the band website regularly throughout the year to find more information about these performances.** Also, we will be sending home performance information throughout the year. Performances normally consist of a December Concert and a Spring Concert; some groups have more performances throughout the year. These as well as any additional performances will be announced well in advance.

#### **CONCERT ATTIRE:**

Attire for each concert performance varies depending on the nature of the performances. Students who do not comply with the concert performance attire will not be allowed to perform and will receive a 0 in the grade book.

Attire for All Grades: 2024-2025 Band T-Shirt, casual dark pants, and close-toed shoes.\*

Some 8th grade performances may allow use of the 2024-2025 Windbreakers (distributed before first parade).

## \*Clarification on unacceptable concert attire:

- Denim Jeans of any color and leggings are not permitted.
- House shoes, slippers, flip-flops, and Crocs are not permitted.
- Accessories such as hats are not permitted.

## **8TH GRADE PARENTS:**

Please take note that near the end of the school year, your child will get the opportunity to join the Brighton High School Band. It is important to keep marching band camp and competition dates in mind well in advance. Ordinarily, band camp takes place the **last three full weeks of July.** 

Also, the High School Band normally has football games on Friday nights from August to November and band competitions every Saturday from mid-September through the end of October. The only Saturday that we normally take off is the Saturday at the end of Fall Break. This means that students will have a competition on the Saturday at the beginning of Fall break.

## **CLASS/STUDENT-SPECIFIC INFORMATION:**

#### **GRADING POLICY:**

The purpose of this policy is to provide a means of grading that fairly reflects the variety of contributions and activities of a performance ensemble. It allows all students to experience success regardless of their individual degree of talent, and it requires all students to be active and positive participants in daily rehearsals, which is absolutely essential for an ensemble to achieve excellence. Below are the three factors that determine band grades and how each factor is assessed within our band classroom:

#### 1. Public Performances and Pass-offs – 50%:

- a. Public performances consist of concerts, solo and ensemble recitals, parades, festivals, and/or football games. Performances vary depending on which grade level your child is in. Performances are considered exams and are required events for participants. In rare circumstances, the director may approve an absence from a performance; absences due to a family vacation or other extracurricular activities are not deemed excused.
- b. **Pass-offs**, also known as playing tests, will be done periodically throughout the school year. These pass-offs will often occur during class; students will either perform pass-offs from their seat within the full band or record their pass-off in the band office during class time. Mr. Kelly will supply equipment for recordings, and the recordings will always be audio only. These recording will be kept until the end of the current nine-weeks period and can be accessed by sending a request via email to Mr. Kelly. Material covered will range from material covered in class to small assignments that require the students to work on material at home. If a student would like to have a pass-off retest, they must discuss and schedule this with Mr. Kelly beforehand. Mr. Kelly believes in rewarding students for work; if a student gets 100% correct on a retest, then the student will receive a 100 in the grade book. **Students must retest pass-offs within the same nine weeks as the original pass-off.**

### 2. Classroom Performance and After School Rehearsals – 40%:

- a. The Weekly Classroom Performance grade includes:
  - i. Immediate set-up upon arrival
  - ii. Individual warm-up, participation in all classroom activities (warm-up, breathing gym, rehearsal, etc.)
  - iii. Preparedness for class (having all materials (including instrument) at your seat, practicing at home, etc.)
  - iv. Accurate Performance of assigned music (correct notes, rhythms, articulations, dynamics, etc)
  - v. Behavior
  - vi. Active Listening
  - vii. Posture/projection
  - viii.Overall musical contribution

#### b. After School Rehearsals:

- i. Attendance to all after school rehearsals is mandatory.
- ii. If a student will be absent from rehearsal, it is their responsibility to communicate that to Mr. Kelly. Any student that does not communicate an absence before the rehearsal takes place will receive a 0 in the grade book until the rehearsal is made up.
- iii. After school rehearsal make-ups can be completed in one of the following ways:
  - 1. Students can attend another rehearsal if one is available (brass players may attend a woodwind rehearsal and vice versa).
  - 2. Students can discuss recording an audio pass-off using a selection from their music. Mr. Kelly will assign the music for the pass-off.

## 3. Homework – Practicing – 10%:

- a. Students will be assessed on practicing by their steady improvement day to day outside the classroom and whether the student takes his or her instrument home daily.
- b. If Mr. Kelly believes that a student or group of students are not practicing, those students will be assigned a practice log, which will need to be signed by the students and parent/guardian each week.

**Please note:** students are **not allowed** to write note names or fingerings <u>consistently</u> on their music, as this inhibits their ability to read music. The students are trained to learn the music and must work to **memorize** note names and fingerings. **Failure to do so is considered cheating.** The act of writing in note names and fingerings will result in a 0 for any grade associated with their music.

The primary responsibilities of each band member are to participate positively in daily rehearsals while improving their playing skills through consistent practice time. If at any time things come up and things become overwhelming, please communicate with Mr. Kelly. In many situations, he will work with the student and guardian to create a solution.

#### **MATERIALS:**

Students are required to have:

- Pencils (no pens)
- A band folder or notebook (Mr. Kelly has folders for students to use if one rips or breaks)
- Instrument
- Assigned Music
- Method book (if applicable) in class every day.

They are also required to have any materials that are required to keep the instrument in working order.

#### • Woodwinds:

Reeds

#### • Brass:

- · Valve/Slide Oil
- Slide Grease

#### • Percussion:

- Percussionists will need a stick bag, 2 pairs of snare drum sticks (Vic Firth SD-1 sticks preferred), marimba mallets, xylophone mallets, and timpani mallets.
- Seventh and Eighth-grade percussionists will also need a pair of marching snare drumsticks.
- All sticks and mallets need to be marked with your name.
- Percussionists will need to bring their sticks and mallets every day.
- Percussionists are required to have a snare drum (or practice pad) and a bell kit for practice at home.

#### \*SCHOOL INSTRUMENTS:

If you are playing a school instrument, such as baritone, tuba, or percussion, it is important to keep the instrument in optimal condition. If any damage occurs while the instrument is in the student's possession, **the student will be responsible** for the repair cost as deemed appropriate by Brighton Band staff.ß

#### **RULES AND PROCEDURES:**

Students are expected to follow all county/school rules, to be respectful, and to be ready to learn. We believe that every student has the right to music education, but no student has the right to rob another student of their education.

With this in mind, please understand that it is not acceptable for a band student to distract other students from learning; off-task behaviors can and will be met with prompts, redirection, alternate seating, parent/guardian contact, and/or temporary removal from the rehearsal.

Band is an extra-curricular subject and membership is a privilege. If problems persist, off-task behaviors will be referred to administration.

It is important to understand that due to band being a performance-based class, much of performance is based off of active participation in rehearsal. It is likely that disruptive behaviors will result in a lower grade and in some cases the loss of full credit for that student's rehearsal grade.

\*Cell Phone Policy: The school's cell phone policy is in effect in the band room. All cell phones are to be turned completely off (meaning not just locked) and stored in the students backpack. Failure to comply will result in the confiscation of the cell phone as per our school's policy. However, there are times where Mr. Kelly will give permission for brief use of cell phone; this will be on a case-by-case basis. If you have not received permission, you will be held to the school's expectations.

\*Chromebook Policy: We do not use chromebooks in the band room. At all. Mr. Kelly will confiscate any chromebooks seen outside of the students' backpacks and treat them the same as cell phones. You will not need your chromebook for this class.

#### **STORAGE ROOM:**

Your instrument may be stored in the storage room in the band room during school hours. The instrument room is intended to be used only during the school day and **should not be a permanent home for your instrument.** 

Students may drop their instrument off before they go to homeroom in the morning and pick them up between 2:35-2:40; these times have been approved by the school and have been announced to all teachers. This time is subject to change by administrative decisions. The use of this room is a privilege; if you misuse the storage room or tamper with another's belongings, storage room privilege may be revoked. The band director, school board, school, or any employees are not liable for any damages that occur to band instruments during any time
